Legal Framework – objectives

Hold all sellers (importers and producers) for the treatment of their post consumer waste for environmental purposes =

Extract textile waste from the bins to provide added value outlets

They have two options:

CONTRIBUTE:

PROVIDE:

Finance a collection and recycling system approved by the state

Set a collection and recycling system that is approved by the state

Legal framework – building blocks

Dec 2006 : Parliament votes a law (L541-10-3) that extends producers responsibility to end of life for the clothing, linen and footwear starting 1st Jan 2007

2007: Unions (producers, sorters and local authorities) collaborate into the construction of the terms and objectives linked to the success of the ERP.

June 2008: Ministries of the Ecology and the Economy co-signed the specifications in which de sector should proceed.

Dec 2008 : Eco TLC is created by the producers to mutualises their funds to provide for recycling of their products as a non for profit private company

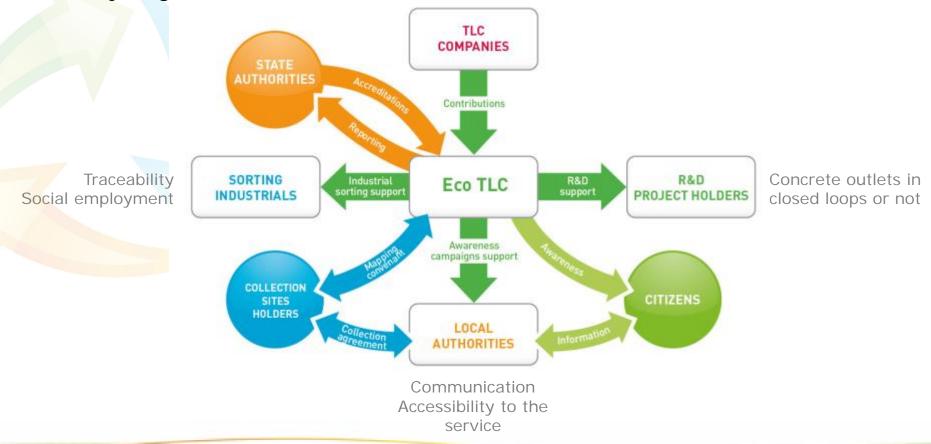
March 2009: Eco TLC is granted rights to be transferred the EPR for the industry (clothing, linen and footwear = TLC) until the end of 2013

Operational framework – terms and objectives

Objectives: treating 50 % of the volume put on the market to sell, reusing or recycling at least 70%



Operational framework – financials

Objectives: contributions should cover the need for financial support.

69 € per incoming metric tons
50€ for all extra tons yoy:
9M€ in 2012 – 65%



0,1 € per inhabitantscovered by service –3M€ - 25% of budget

Current results - Collection

Participation is voluntary for both local authorities and collectors.

Two main contributions:

Diversity of collection sites participating : over 26 000 sites.

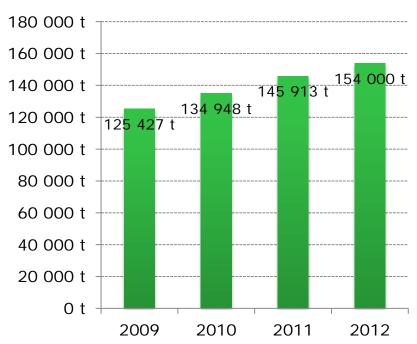

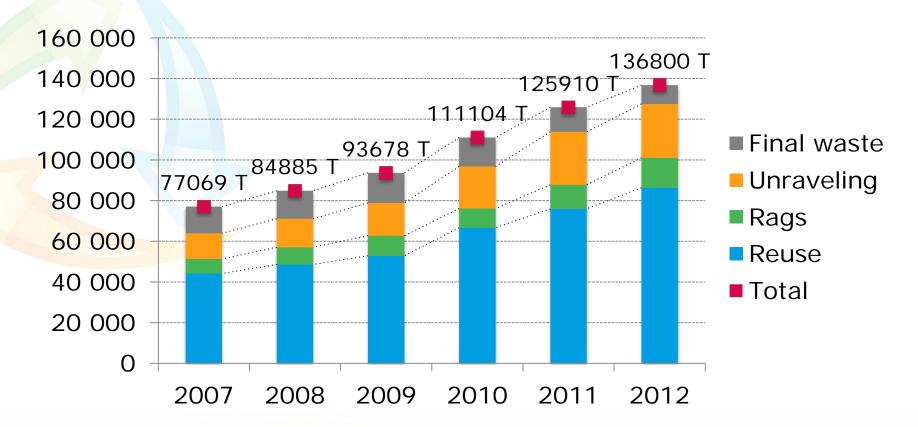

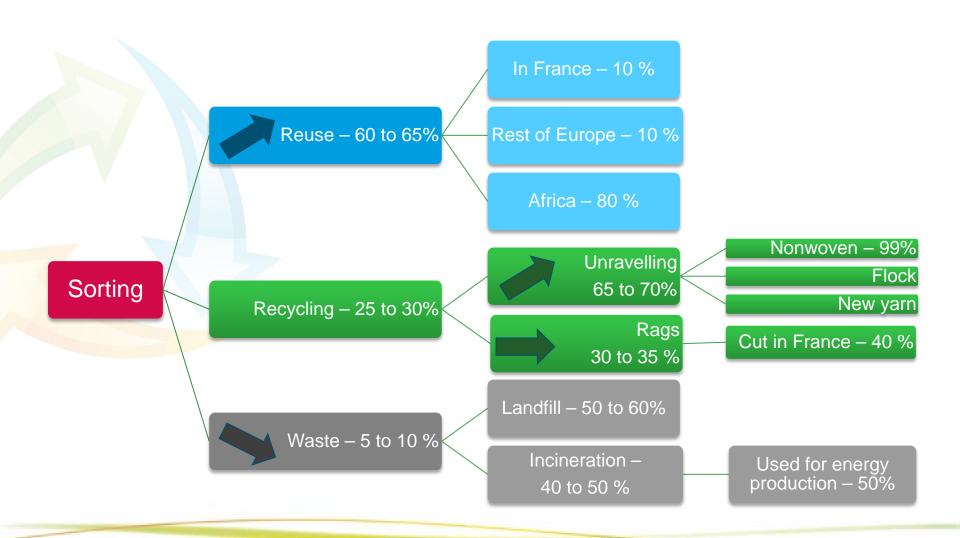


Current results - Sorting

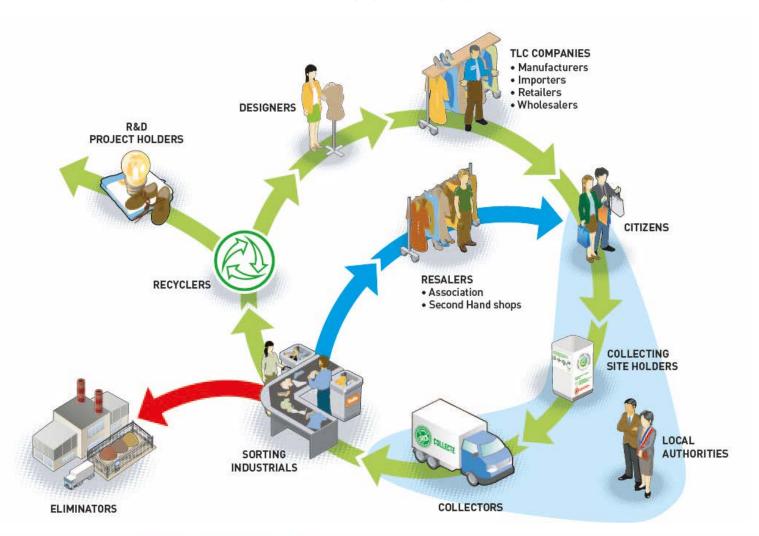
